


BE SELF CARE AWARE

Speak to your local pharmacist about stocking up on your medicines cabinet to treat common conditions for you and your family

The following medications can be purchased from pharmacies or your local supermarket and are generally **cheaper than buying them on prescription.**

- Allergy medicines
- Simple pain killers like paracetamol and ibuprofen
- Sore throat, coughs, colds and flu medications
- · Heartburn and indigestion remedies
- Pile (haemorrhoid) treatments
- Anti-diarrhoea medication
- Rehydration salts
- First aid kit including plasters and bandages
- Thermometer
- Tissues

By keeping a selection of essential medications at home you can treat common conditions in a



timely manner, avoid unnecessary trips to see your doctor and/or even visits to the A&E department.
